
# What we do

# Overview: 2021-22

"One of the major challenges that artists confronted during the pandemic and the enforced hiatus in live, in-person performances and events, was how to remain engaged with their audiences. Embracing digital and online platforms provided a solution which not only helped artists to reconnect with existing audiences, but opened up new, sometimes global audiences for local arts."

#### Post-pandemic recovery

Almost exactly two years after they were first introduced, the last remaining COVID-19 legal restrictions came to an end in Northern Ireland in March 2022. Following the government's successful vaccination programme, public health restrictions eased during the year and we welcomed the cautious reopening of arts venues and the return of live in-person performances and activities. The Arts Council's funding programmes reflected this transition as well as the new set of challenges presented by the operating environment in which artists and arts organisations now found themselves. The focus shifted from 'survival' to 'recovery', with specific COVID Recovery Programmes designed to support the sector in rebuilding professional and technical skills and reducing operating deficits which had arisen as a result of the pandemic. In addition, a Health and Safety Capital Programme supported a number of key organisations and venues to reopen their creative spaces safely for the return of practitioners and audiences.

In the year up to March 2022, the Arts Council produced a substantial body of research, which informed the design and delivery of a suite of Emergency Funding Programmes, co-produced with our sponsor department, the Department for Communities. Large-scale surveys of arts practitioners,

freelancers, creatives and arts and cultural organisations, revealed the true extent of the impact of the pandemic on Northern Ireland's creative sector. The evidence that we gathered also contributed to the work of the Department for Communities' Culture, Arts and Heritage Recovery Taskforce, which, in its final report, 'The Art of Recovery – Survive: Stabilise: Strengthen', recommended additional resources, new partnerships across government, and strategic investment in talent acquisition, retention and development, to return the arts and culture sectors back to good health in post-COVID Northern Ireland.

#### Blueprint

The long-term sustainability of small- to medium-sized cultural organisations received a significant boost with the introduction of the 'Blueprint' programme. Led by Arts & Business Northern Ireland and supported by National Lottery Dormant Accounts Funding NI, a cohort of public and private funders will work together over the coming five-year period to help future-proof a number of arts organisations through training and mentoring and initiatives designed to free up capacity, test new income generation solutions and incentivise financial growth. 'Blueprint' represents the realisation of one of the priority development ambitions of the Arts Council's current 5-Year Strategic Plan, 'Inspire, Connect, Lead'.

#### Withdrawal from the EU

The UK's withdrawal from the EU creates particular issues for artists from Northern Ireland, who have a long and distinguished history of international touring, notably across the island of Ireland. The strong historical relationship between the Arts Council of Northern Ireland and An Chomhairle Ealaíon continues to be significant in this respect, as we explore joint initiatives, such as an all-island touring programme, which will build on the framework of support that we already offer to our jointly-funded clients.

To help artists and arts organisations steer their way through the new rules governing travel and trade with counterparts in the European Union, the Arts Council joined with Arts Council England, Creative Scotland, and Arts Council Wales/Wales Arts International to provide guidance and funding support. The collaboration yielded a new pilot funding scheme, the Four Nations International Fund, to support exchanges, residencies, partnership development, co-creation and networking, and the development of new models of international collaboration. It also led to the creation of the Arts Infopoint UK, which provides information on practical issues relating to artist mobility and explores new bilateral initiatives with EU states.

#### **Minority Ethnic and Rural Deliberative Forums**

The Arts Council's 5-Year Strategic Plan expresses a clear priority to address opportunities for minority ethnic artists and to increase the rural reach of our funding. Work in both areas got well underway in 2021-22 with the establishment of Minority Ethnic and Rural Deliberative Forums, created to ensure that under-represented groups not traditionally associated with decision-making are implicitly involved in the decisions that affect them. In addition to establishing the Minority Ethnic Deliberative Forum, we opened a new

pilot funding programme to support the development of minority ethnic artists, creative practitioners and administrators. The Mentoring and Residency Programme for Minority Ethnic Artists programme awarded £107,000 to 27 artists, to assist the artists at every stage of their career, through skills development and career pathways, including training, research, cultural exchange, creative residencies, and networking opportunities. A rural engagement funding programme that will provide a cohesive approach to the needs of local rural communities, is scheduled to open early in 2022-23.

#### **Creative Industries**

One of the major challenges that artists confronted during the pandemic and the enforced hiatus in live, in-person performances and events, was how to remain engaged with their audiences. Embracing digital and online platforms provided a solution which not only helped artists to reconnect with existing audiences, but opened up new, sometimes global audiences for local arts. Responding to the potential of new and emerging technologies for the production as well as the consumption of the arts, the Arts Council introduced three funding programmes to advance the development of the arts within the digital marketplace. A Digital Evolution Awards scheme for individual artists provided nine artists with access to the specialist skills required to create high-quality arts projects using innovative digital technologies; a similar scheme for organisations opened for applications late in the financial year. We launched a Creative Industries Seed Fund in January 2022, in collaboration with Future Screens NI, to support arts organisations, entrepreneurs and creative businesses to work in partnerships to enhance the specialist skills required to unlock the vast potential of the technology, including future income generation for artists.

#### Creative Schools

We were pleased this year to be able to resume our Creative Schools Partnership with the Education Authority and Urban Villages, so that professional artists are once again active in educational settings, teaching students the creative skills that will build confidence and self-motivation, as well as contributing to improved mental health and wellbeing. This pioneering arts and education programme, originally launched in 2018 as part of the NI Executive's Together: Building a United Community (T:BUC) strategy, is based on research indicating that access to quality arts experiences at school can contribute to improved educational outcomes across all subjects. With a £100,000 investment from Arts Council National Lottery funding, the programme will now run for a further two-year period, supporting 13 schools in areas with histories of deprivation and community tension. The programme received the endorsement of First Minister Paul Givan and Deputy First Minister Michelle O'Neil.

#### **Obituaries**

We said goodbye this year to a number of significant personages associated with the arts in Northern Ireland, including one of the giants of 20th Century Irish literature, Seamus Deane, and cultural activist and founding member of Northern Visions, Marilyn Hyndman.

# A Year in the Arts 2021-22

A flavour of the year's activities by the hundreds of artists, arts organisations and venues that are supported by the Arts Council of Northern Ireland through our Exchequer and National Lottery funds.

# **April 2021**

Beyond Skin and the Afghanistan National Institute of Music build relations between young musicians in Northern Ireland and the Afghan Women's Orchestra, which leads to a joint music video celebrating International Women's Day and challenging the recent statement banning girls in Afghanistan from singing in school.



Highlighting Earth Day, NI artist Robin Price's photographic project, 'Air of the Anthropocene', reveals environmental pollution in cities across the world, raising awareness of our growing pollution problem and creating open discussion for potential government-backed interventions.



The Lyric's New Playwrights Programme, now in its fourth year, provides a six-month writing development opportunity for five new and early career writers to create new work: Caitlin Magnall-Kearns, Caoimhe Farren, Rose Coogan, Paul Mallon and Eléonore Maudet.



Digital Arts Studios announces the third year of its Future Labs creative programme, providing training and technical support to upskill artists across all disciplines who wish to experiment with new and emerging technologies, as well as to enhance their skills with more commonly used video and audio equipment and software.



The Arts Council and the MAC, in association with Libraries NI, mark World Book Night by gifting 160 free copies of Glenn Patterson's 'Where Are We Now?' to community groups, book clubs, libraries and members of the public.



Cara Murphy, distinguished NI Silversmith, designs Randox Grand National 2021 trophy with illustrations paying tribute to Covid pandemic key workers.



# May 2021

Echo Echo Dance Theatre Company launch an online series of bite-sized courses designed to encourage the exploration of choreographed movement in the comfort of your own home.



The Arts Council announces the award of £13 million in core grants to 97 of Northern Ireland's key arts organisations, through its Annual Funding Programme.



The Arts Council's Head of Community Arts and Education, Gilly Campbell, talks about the importance of the arts to mental health in the lead up to the NI Mental Health Arts Festival, which platforms high-quality art work that deals compassionately and intelligently with mental health, and includes the launch of a specially-commissioned publication on the theme of Loneliness.



Arts Care delivers online arts training to over 150 healthcare workers to give them the confidence to deliver arts activities to vulnerable older people in residential care settings, supported by the Arts Council's Arts and Older People Programme.





## June 2021

BBC Radio 1's Annie Mac unveils her Belfast-set debut novel, 'Mother, Mother', at an online edition of the annual Belfast Book Festival presented by the Crescent Arts Centre.



Belfast Photo Festival becomes one of the first of NI's arts festivals to return to a largely in-person event, using a range of public spaces, galleries and online platforms to showcase local artists and renowned international photographers.




Ulster Orchestra's Learning and Community Engagement Department brings music into the heart of primary schools with its Crescendo Project, working with The Greater Shankill Children & Young People Zone, Colin Neighbourhood Partnership and The Centre for Evidence and Social Innovation at Queen's University, Belfast.



#### Curtain up on £12.2m Grand Opera House restoration

The Grand Opera House in Belfast reopens following completion of its £12.2m restoration and development project, which saw the refurbishment of the auditorium, redesign of the foyer and bar, and upgrading of facilities and technical infrastructure.



# June 2021

350 guests join the online Arts & Business NI Awards, in partnership with Forestside, to celebrate the inspiring partnerships of the past 18 months between the worlds of business and the arts.



# July 2019

Senior representatives of the Arts Council appear before the Northern Ireland Assembly's Communities Committee to brief members on the pandemic's impact on income and revenue generation, employment, and the need for additional emergency funding support for the arts sector.



Six short films by Elspeth Visher capture choreographer Aisling McCormick's new work, 'In Situ Solos', inspired by the empty streets and 'stay home' message during lockdown and reimagining Belfast's streets as an outdoor performance space.



'The 32: An Anthology of Irish Working Class Voices', edited by Belfast novelist Paul McVeigh, celebrates established and emerging working-class voices from across the island of Ireland.



The Arts Council awards over £1.9 million of National Lottery funding to support 88 arts organisations to deliver a series of high-quality arts projects and events across the region.

#### Portrait of Northern Ireland Centenary exhibition

'Portrait of Northern Ireland – Neither an Elegy nor a Manifesto', a major exhibition supported by the Northern Ireland Office as part of its Centenary programme, runs at Belfast's Golden Thread Gallery and showcases 100 pieces of art featuring the people and places that have defined NI over the past 100 years. Ten major works by some of Northern Ireland's leading creators of theatre, dance makers and arts organisations, are showcased at Edinburgh Festival Fringe 'Connect', a new online event and networking platform for arts industry and Fringe artists. The event is curated by the Arts Council in partnership with Belfast International Arts Festival and Theatre and Dance NI, with support from British Council NI.



# August 2021

Open House Festival hosts three weeks of music, comedy, spoken word and classic cinema in the beautiful open air surroundings of Bangor Castle Walled Garden



The Belfast Book Festival showcases new works by established and debut talent, with headliners including Booker-shortlisted author Bernard MacLaverty, author and performer Joelle Taylor, and bestselling memoirist Elisabeth Day.



The Arts Council launches a new Instagram account to showcase works from its Collection; the leading public contemporary art collection for Northern Ireland representing artists at the forefront of visual arts practice.



ArtsEkta's Belfast Mela provides a popular week-long programme celebrating cultural diversity, with world music, dance, food and art.



# September 2021

First Minister Paul Givan and Deputy First Minister Michelle O'Neil endorse the Creative Schools Partnership, a two-year funding initiative from the Arts Council, the Education Authority and the Urban Villages Initiative, designed to promote creative learning in the classroom.




The Arts Council partners with Creative & Cultural Skills to provide a new training and professional development programme, with free expert advice and support to help a wider range of talent enter the creative workforce.

# September 2021

#### Lockdown films celebrate new works by D/deaf, neurodivergent and disabled artists

Twelve D/deaf, neurodivergent and disabled professional artists based in Northern Ireland, England, Wales and Scotland are commissioned to produce new film and audio works as part of BBC Arts' Culture in Quarantine initiative, broadcast on BBC I-Player. Three of the artists are from Northern Ireland: playwright Shannon Yee creates a dance theatre film, 'Pandemic Parenting: Pandemonium', exploring the challenges of parenting during lockdown; animator Joel Simon's 'The Cat, The Mouse and The Sausage' retells a Grimm's Brothers fairy tale; and poet/comedian Alice McCullough adapts her one-woman show 'Earth to Alice' about the twists and turns of bipolar disorder during the pandemic.



#### Arts Council opens first mentoring and residency programme for minority ethnic artists

The Arts Council awards £107,000 to 27 minority ethnic artists, creative practitioners and arts administrators. Individual grants of up-to £5,000 support skills development, specialist training, research, cultural exchange and networking, which will help build careers and increase opportunities for young and emerging minority ethnic artists and creatives. In addition to the new funding awards, the Arts Council establishes a Deliberative Forum to improve understanding of the needs of minority ethnic artists and strengthen their voice in decision making.





## October 2021

The 59th Belfast International Arts Festival presents an inspirational programme to positively contribute to the post-Covid social, economic and cultural revival of the city and connect Northern Ireland with the best of contemporary arts practice from around the world.



Armagh City, Banbridge and Craigavon Borough Council's bid succeeds in reaching the longlist for UK City of Culture.



Derry City welcomes the return of the City of Derry International Choir Festival with a sensational programme of world-class choral music, including Grammy award-winners and exclusive global premiere performances.



The team at the Centre for Contemporary Art in Derry celebrate being shortlisted for the 2021 Art Fund Museum of the Year, the world's largest museum prize.



The second annual NI Writers Day, organised by the Royal Society of Literature and the Arts Council, celebrates contemporary voices in literature with a series of free online workshops and events for readers and writers.



# November 2021

Arts & Business NI opens applications for its 'Blueprint' pioneering 5-year cultural sustainability programme, designed to enable small- to medium-sized cultural organisations in NI to take a longer-term approach to income generation.

#### Belfast awarded prestigious UNESCO City of Music title

Belfast is awarded the coveted City of Music status by UNESCO, celebrating the city's rich musical heritage and recognising the importance of music to its future. Belfast is only the third city in the UK to become a City of Music, joining Liverpool and Glasgow. There are 59 Cities of Music forming the UNESCO Creative Cities Network.



## November 2021

DU Dance and Beyond Skin develop an international youth cultural exchange project, 'Ode to Earth', with German partners as one of seven Cultural Bridge projects funded by the British Council, the UK Arts Councils and other partners.



#### Culture, Arts and Heritage Recovery Taskforce publishes recommendations

The Arts Council endorses the Taskforce's recommendations which seek additional resources and new partnerships across government to bring the arts and culture sectors back to good health, and highlights the urgent need in post-Covid NI for strategic investment in talent development and retention.



#### Silver Win for Stage Beyond

Stage Beyond, the Derry-based theatre company for actors with learning disabilities, receives international recognition with a New York Festivals Radio Award 2021 for Best Digital Drama aired by RTE Radio 1, for their recording, 'Hamlet, Prince of Derry'. This is the theatre company's second award for this production, having earlier received the Achates foundation prize for most innovative and dynamic new works.






# December 2021

# January 2022

The pilot 'Four Nations International Fund', devised by the UK arts councils, supports 38 projects to develop innovative models of international cultural exchange and collaboration. The projects bring together 82 UK and 48 international partners based in over 24 different countries, from Mexico to Kenya, Barbados to Australia and throughout Europe and USA. The three projects chosen to take part from Northern Ireland include those led by performance artist, Sinéad O'Donnell, Accidental Theatre and Three's Theatre Company.

# February 2022

BBC Arts and One Dance UK's 'A Season of Arts' celebrates the world-class dance happening across the UK, including 'Don't Miss Flight', a short dance film about that universal desire to fly, by Northern choreographer/Co-Director, Jennifer Rooney and Co-Director, Ciarán Haggerty.



The inaugural Look North! Festival showcases North Belfast's rich cultural heritage and its creative and literary talents, as it tells the story of a vibrant and diverse community.



### March 2022

The Irish Pages Press/Cló An Mhíl Bhuí wins 'The British Book Awards Small Press of the Year 2022 (Island of Ireland)', the first time that a press based in Northern Ireland has first been shortlisted and then won any of the three relevant British Book Awards for publishers administered by The Bookseller magazine in London.



Women's Aid ABCLN, an organisation addressing domestic abuse and providing services for women and children across Antrim, Ballymena, Carrickfergus, Larne and Newtownabbey, partners with Spark Opera to deliver a project that uses the arts to help older women who have experienced domestic abuse.



Arts Council research reveals that 900 older people living in care homes in Northern Ireland benefitted from the arts during the pandemic, with the Arts and Older People Programme helping to alleviate isolation and loneliness and promote positive mental health and wellbeing.



The Imagine! Belfast Festival of Ideas and Politics returns to live events after two years operating online, with its biggest ever week-long programme of talks, workshops, theatre, comedy, music, exhibitions, film and tours.



# Funding Programmes & Research Publications, 2021-22

Almost exactly two years after they were first introduced, the last remaining Covid-19 legal restrictions came to an end in Northern Ireland in March 2022. Following the government's successful vaccination programme in 2021-22, restrictions eased during the year and we welcomed the cautious reopening of arts venues and the return of live in-person performances and activities. The Arts Council funding programmes and research publications reflect this transition and the exceptionally challenging circumstances in which artists and arts organisations nevertheless continued to create great art, connect with audiences, and provide both solace and inspiration.



The Arts Council offers a range of grant programmes that you can apply to for funding. Some programmes are specifically for organisations and others are for individual artists. #### When can I apply?

Most grant programmes take place in funding rounds with specific dates when we will accept applications. Some programmes are open all year round. For information on funding deadlines, visit the Funding pages of our website.

#### How long will it take to reach a decision?

This may vary with each programme, although we would generally aim to make a decision on applications from individuals and organisations within three months.

#### Where can I get help with my application?

The guidance notes for each programme provide information on the assessment criteria, eligibility and application process. Our Arts Development Officers can also offer advice and assistance before you submit an application. Contact details are available in the **About Us** section of our website, or you can contact the switchboard and you will be directed to the most appropriate person.

#### How do I complain to the Arts Council?

The Arts Council has a <u>Service Charter</u> which outlines the standard of service our clients should expect from us. We operate a <u>Service Complaints Procedure</u> to handle general complaints about our service. In addition, we operate a <u>Funding Review Procedure</u> for those who want to appeal a decision about a grant application. These documents are available on the website.
